One year to go for State rehabilitation service

This month, Fiona Stanley Hospital (FSH) begins its final year countdown to launching the \$255.7 million State rehabilitation service (SRS). The 140-bed SRS will be housed in a purpose-built facility at FSH and will be the first service to open at the hospital in October 2014.

Situated next door to the main hospital, the SRS will have the capacity to rehabilitate patients with the most complex conditions on the one site, including spinal cord injuries, acquired brain injuries, neurological conditions, amputations and complex trauma. This means patients will benefit from having direct access to acute care services, reducing wait times and expediting treatment.

The new rehabilitation facility will also offer a new model of care based on international best practice examined by medical, nursing and allied health professionals from across the State.

Medical Co-Director, Dr Hannah Seymour, said the model incorporates the most successful components from a variety of models used internationally to provide the

very best outcomes for patients.

"The model of care for the State rehabilitation service at FSH will give patients and their families' greater participation in their treatment and provide for increased collaboration between clinicians," Dr Seymour said.

Key benefits for patients will include a single point of contact, early assessment and commencement of rehabilitation needs, access to therapy seven days a week and formal treatment plans that will be established within a patients' first week of admission.

The rehabilitation services provided at Royal Perth Hospital's Shenton Park campus will transition to the new SRS facility at FSH, and patients from all across WA will be eligible for referral.

Conserving the health of local environment

The Fiona Stanley Hospital (FSH) project achieved a significant milestone in its environmental program with the successful rehabilitation of nearly 50 hectares of land within the Beeliar Regional Park.

Seven sites within the park were formally handed back to the Department of Parks and Wildlife on Wednesday 11 September as part of the State Government's \$7.3 million commitment to conservation programs in Murdoch and surrounding neighbourhoods.

More than 300 grasstrees and zamias were salvaged from the FSH site for re-planting in local areas. Plants which are difficult to grow from seeds, including 1,700 native orchids, were recovered and propagated for reuse.

Rehabilitation included the relocation of topsoil, habitat logs salvaged from the FSH site prior to construction, and the re-introduction of species suitable for Carnaby's Black-Cockatoo habitat.

FSH Executive Director Brad Sebbes said prior to FSH's rehabilitation program the sites were highly degraded, lacking in native plant species and contained a large number of invasive weeds.

"Weed, erosion and feral pest control were undertaken in order to protect the native bushland," he said.

"Most of the sites now exceed targets for native species density and diversity, and all seven now have the capacity to self-sustain."

Other off-site conservation programs undertaken by FSH include the purchase and protection of native bushland sites, fauna relocation, investment into community-based conservation programs and funding for Carnaby's Black Cockatoo research.

First helicopter lands

The first helicopter landed on the FSH helipad on Monday 2 September, marking another major milestone in preparation for a staged opening of the hospital from October 2014.

When it opens next year, FSH will be the only hospital outside the Perth CBD with a helipad and will provide a crucial service to patients from Rottnest Island and metropolitan and rural regions south of the city.

Large enough to accommodate the two largest emergency helicopters in the State, the helipad is expected to transport a couple of patients each week once operational. This will provide an essential service for critically ill people requiring urgent tertiary and intensive care, including critical burns and cardiothoracic cases.

It is strategically located above operating theatres, intensive care and the emergency department, and is built primarily as a floating deck on rubber bearing pads which will mitigate vibration to improve patient comfort.

The helipad test was conducted to measure noise and vibration levels to ensure they were at an acceptable level.
